Forty-one of the 44 President-Elects* traveled to Greensboro, NC in mid-March for the Carolinas' PETS. Back in the mid-90s, our District joined forces with six other Districts to provide this training. PEs from all over North Carolina and half of South Carolina meet over a two and half day period. Additionally, the District Governor string and Assistant Governors also attended sessions to prepare them for their year. All told, there were approximately 500 people in attendance!

With such a large group of Rotary Leaders being brought together, the Carolinas' PETS team is able to secure truly amazing and inspiring keynote speakers including Rotary International Trustee Marty Helman, Past Rotary International Director John Smarge, Social Media Expert Jason Browne, and Dan Quinn, a local (Greensboro) Rotarian with a heartwarming story about a program that he created.

Carolinas' PETS offers several breakout sessions with PEs from similar-sized Clubs to learn about Membership, Foundation, Public Image and Effective Leadership. These sessions were led by a team of Past District Governors including our own Immediate Past District Governor Tammy Mosteller, and PDG (07-08) Bill Shillito. District 7670 PEs had the opportunity to meet their Assistant Governor and the District Governor string, get to know each other, and learn about key dates and goals for 24-25. Rishika Reddy, 2023-24 Global Grant Scholar

This is the fifth and final spotlight in the series featuring the 2023-24 Global Grant Scholars.

Rishika Reddy is one of the five Global Grant Scholars being sponsored by District 7670 this year. She was awarded a Global Grant Scholarship to round-out her training to become a medical doctor, by completing Master of Science research in Sexual & Reproductive Health at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, in England.









After high school in Cary, Rishika earned Bachelor of Science degrees in both Neuroscience and Psychology, on a Morehead-Cain scholarship, from UNC at Chapel Hill in 2020. She is currently enrolled at the UNC School of Medicine and will graduate in 2024. She spent part of the 2022-23 academic year on her practicum at Mission Hospital in Asheville. Certified as a doula by the UNC School of Nursing, Rishika has been a volunteer doula since 2018. With internships and projects with the UNC Comprehensive Cancer Center, the World Health Organization, the Foundation for International Medical Relief of Children, and the UNC Department of Psychology and Neuroscience, her passion for her chosen career is clearly evident.

Rishika summarized her reason for applying for the global grant scholarship, $\hat{a} \in \omega I$ plan to focus on sexual and reproductive health policies and research to further my understanding of the barriers to high-quality care faced by mothers and women of reproductive age. I believe that the international and interdisciplinary insight into population health services and management offered by the institutions to which I am applying would allow me to better advocate for the development, research, and implementation of community-based interventions focused on improving maternal care in minority populations. $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{R}$

After the scholarship period ends, Rishika plans to return to UNC Chapel Hill in early fall 2024 to complete additional coursework in OB-GYN and graduate with her MD. She will also work towards completing residency applications and interviews for four-year residency programs, where research could play a role in her career and where there is more opportunity for involvement with community outreach initiatives to increase access to perinatal and maternal health.

David Mans, President Nominee of the Rotary Club of Asheville, is Rishika's International sponsor liaison; District 1130's Rotary Club of Canary Wharf, in London's historic Docklands, is her Host sponsor Club.

Saluting PDG Richard Howe

PDG Richard Howe, who died March 27, 2024. Rotary Club of Boone (NC), District 7670. Served District 7670 in 1990-91 and 1996-97.

Richard Howe, age 84, of Blowing Rock, North Carolina, passed away on March 27, 2024, following illness from cancer. He was predeceased by his father Kenneth Elisha Howe and mother Eva Theatrice Davis Howe, siblings Mary Kathryn Howe-Hawk, Theatrice Jeanne Febus, Dora Louise Howe Culp, George Franklin Howe, Keith Howard Howe, Kenneth Eugene Howe, Karen Lynette Howe and stepbrother James Roscoe Proctor. He left behind one stepsister, Maxine Howe Dorsey and her family, his wife, Betty Carol Barker Howe, who lives in Blowing Rock, North Carolina, and his daughter,?Caroline Elizabeth Howe, who lives in Boston, Massachusetts with her husband, Benjamin Clapp, and their daughters Grace, Elizabeth, and Lillian.

He was born on May 6, 1939 in Latham, Illinois. He received his B.S. and M.A. degrees from Appalachian State University (ASU) in Boone, North Carolina and his Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). At ASU, he won an athletic scholarship to play basketball during his undergrad years and was later inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame for basketball. He was also awarded ASU's Distinguished Alumni Award.

Richard spent most of his professional career working for his beloved alma mater, ASU, and dedicated 43 years of service to the school. During his time at ASU, he was the assistant to the chancellor, the University's Compliance Officer, and a professor in the Reich College of Education. In the College of Education, he taught graduate courses in history, law, and higher education.

In 1978 he married his perfect match, Betty Carol Barker. They made their home in Blowing Rock, North Carolina, and were married for 46 years. They raised their daughter, Caroline Elizabeth Howe, there and were surrounded by a kind and supportive neighborhood community. Richard was a consummate cheerleader for his ladies in everything they pursued and never missed a game or match in which his daughter played. During his last years of life when he struggled with the residual effects of radiation treatment from cancer, Betty devotedly cared for him.

Richard was an incredible athlete and sports fanatic and enjoyed playing doubles and singles tennis at Deer Valley Racquet Club with his crew of guy friends. Ever the fierce competitor, his long baseline shots and lefty serves were hard to defend, showing no mercy on the court for anyone, friend or not. He adored his group of guy friends who he called, "the boys,†and when he retired, he enjoyed meeting them for lunch and fellowship twice a week.

He loved reading and writing poetry and found great comfort in British poetry, especially. He quoted his favorite lines of poetry to his family daily and during car rides to school. His daughter was able to return the favor by reciting his favorite poems back to him, out loud, during his last days.

A dedicated member of the service organization, Rotary International, he served?six terms as club president of the Rotary Club of Boone and two terms as district governor of District 7670. He also raised over \$10 million for The Rotary Foundation.

His family will remember and cherish his enthusiastic, never-back-down spirit, and his unwavering dedication to the people and institutions he loved.

Wells for Nora Project



The Rotary Club of Murphy has consistently supported the Wells for Nora project and is excited to share this with others. LifeWaterCanada is the organization the club partnered with to get clean water to those in need in other countries. The World Health Organization says about 1.7 billion people are forced to use disease-filled water for drinking and cooking. About 505,000 die every year from preventable, water-related diseases. Sadly, children are the most vulnerable, making up more than half of those deaths. In response to this need, the mission of LifeWaterCanada is to provide safe drinking water and improve hygiene in Africa and Haiti. The focus of their work there is because these countries have less access to safe water than most countries, because their governments have limited capacity to respond to this need, and because there is a general lack of required equipment and trained workers. In addition, groundwater is readily accessible at low cost, resulting in high project success rates and maximum impact for every dollar invested.

To date, the Rotary Club of Murphy has repaired nearly 100 water pumps and drilled one new well. Each well and repair provides water to approximately 500 individuals, so the club has helped to provide water to over 40,000 people through this project. The Rotary Club of Murphy partnered with Life Water Canada because they not only provide clean water, but they also teach proper sanitation practices to the community. Ninety-four cents of every dollar goes toward providing clean water. When repairs are needed, Life Water Canada requires the villagers to actually participate in the repair process, and they have several distribution locations in the country, which allow parts to be provided. Other items constructed when needed include water retention systems and community toilets. Life Water Canada is ranked within the top 10 charities in Canada. The picture attached is a "thank you" to the Rotary Club of Murphy from the villagers in several different villages.

Now Taking 2024 Tennent Scholarship Applications!

Rotary Club of Asheville has a commitment to helping our community and one of the ways we do this is through our annual needs-based Tennent Scholarship.

The Buzz Tennent Scholarship was established by the Rotary Club of Asheville to support post high school students to achieve knowledge and skills essential for life and careers. Buzz Tennent was a Past President of the Rotary Club of Asheville (1939-1940) who went on to serve as District Governor in 1943-1944 and President of Rotary International in 1957-1958. The funds for the scholarship are donated by club members or raised through various fundraisers held throughout the year.

Those graduating from high school in 2024 are eligible to apply. Application deadline is April 14, 2024.

Additional requirements and guidelines are:

They must be a Buncombe County student (city, county, or private school)

- They must provide a transcript of their grades
- They must have successful out of school activities, e.g. work, volunteer, study, intern.
- They must <u>attach 3 letters of recommendation</u>: at least 1 from teacher, other 2 from non-family sources
- They must provide Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) documentation
- They must answer each question and provide all requested information on the application
- They must provide a photo
