## **July is Maternal & Child Health Month**



Rotary improves access to high-quality healthcare for vulnerable mothers and children, ensuring longer, healthier lives. We strive to broaden the reach of excellent medical services, offering every mother and child equal opportunities for a robust future. Tragically, malnutrition, inadequate healthcare, and poor sanitation claim the lives of an estimated 5.9 million children under five each year â€″ preventable losses.

Rotary supports education, immunizations, birth kits, and mobile health clinics. We educate women on preventing mother-to-infant HIV transmission, breastfeeding practices, and safeguarding themselves and their children from diseases.

The Rotary Foundation empowers communities to manage their own maternal and infant healthcare by providing essential assistance and training where it's most needed. One of Rotary's impactful initiatives is the establishment of mobile prenatal clinics, exemplified by the program in Haiti. With the highest maternal and infant mortality rate in the western hemisphere, Rotary responded by supplying a fully equipped medical jeep. This vehicle enables volunteers and midwives to access remote regions, providing crucial healthcare to mothers and children in these underserved areas.

Rotary has also facilitated a remarkable initiative in India with a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness programs. In Chennai, India, where many women suffer high mortality rates from late-stage diagnoses of breast and cervical cancer, Rotary's efforts are making a significant impact. Rotarians also, initiated a \$3 million, five-year pilot project aimed at saving the lives of mothers and children during home deliveries in Nigeria. Additionally, since 2005, they have successfully repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas  $\hat{a} \in \mathscr{C}$  exceeding their initial goal by 500  $\hat{a} \in \mathscr{C}$  thereby restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.


## **Happy New Rotary Year**

#### **Welcome, Jennifer Jones**

President-Elect Eva Michelle filled in for President Pat who was on vacation. She introduced Jennifer Jones, the first female President of Rotary International.

Jennifer Jones is a self-described â€~Storyteller in Chief' of her marketing firm in Windsor, Canada and that is an apt description. She shared stories from her **Imagine Impact Tour** during her presidency that covered 6

continents and reached 1.3 billion people.

Jennifer feels if we dream our wildest dreams, we can make them happen. She shared words of wisdom from her brother as he coached her for a media interview about creating a civil society. "In order to live in the kind of society you want, you have to build it.†She reminded us that as Rotarians, we envision a world where people unite to create lasting change in ourselves and the world. She thinks that creating lasting change in ourselves might be the most important part of that statement. She encouraged us to create a space for everyone to have an opportunity to serve.

Jennifer decided to frame her presidency around the 7 areas of focus plus an additional eighth  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  Rotary $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  fight against Polio. Her visits were to places in the world where she could shine a light on important work being done in those areas of



focus and, in doing so, she met world leaders from the Pope to heads of state and to local leaders. To her, the most important people she met were the Rotarians â€" some of the 1.4 million members of Rotary working to make the world a better place.

Jennifer $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^M$ s stories were powerful, heartbreaking and inspiring. She highlighted stories of her travel  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^M$  from the slums of Karachi (where 18 million people live) to participate in the vaccination program, to Uganda to see efforts to improve education, to Taiwan for community and economic development efforts - her world tour illuminated the 7 areas of focus for Rotary International. In her year as president, she and her husband visited 57 countries.

**I encourage Rotarians to listen to her speech and hear her stories first hand.** She ended with a great story about a Canadian Border Crossing Guard who questioned her about Rotary. She highlighted the need for each of us to be ambassadors for Rotary by telling the stories of the good work we are doing in the world.
