District Council Approves Youth Protection Policy

The District Council adopted a new Youth Protection Policy at their March 23 meeting. District Governor David Waechter presented the policy to the Council in response to our youth services committee and Youth Protection Officer Bob Carpenter seeking a more formal outline of proper procedures for youth and Rotary engagement. The policy follows guidelines provided by Rotary International and formally addresses the importance of protecting our young people working together with Rotary. This is the first time our district has enacted a comprehensive policy for youth engagement and it marks a critical point in our efforts to increase our interaction and collaboration with young people in District 7670.

In response to the new policy adoption, DG David said, "This policy has been needed for some time. We have been blessed to have no major incidents with our youth in District 7670, and this policy provides guidance and support so that we can maintain our positive engagment with young people in the long term."

A key part of the policy is that all Rotarians who interact with young people will need to renew annually their training on Youth Protection. The training is readily available and relatively simple to complete. Vist the Learning Center on www.rotary.org to complete the training. It is also important to note that more in depth training and procedures are necessary for youth exchange programs. Youth Exchange is specifically addressed in the complete Youth Protection Policy.

 useful models
- Identifies minorities and other individuals/groups/organizations with diverse backgrounds in the local area who might be interested in joining clubs within District 7670
- · Identifies current club members with diverse backgrounds who might be interested in leadership opportunities
- · Helps identify diversity programs and speakers for club and district programs
- · Acts as a diversity program resource for club members and/or community businesses and organizations
- Ensures diversity webpage on District 7670 s website remains updated and interesting
- · Authors and publishes consistent thought-provoking diversity articles and social media posts
- · Supports the development of diversity and inclusion information for club new member orientation materials



Waynesville Sunrise with Special Guest John Fer

John Fer was born in 1937 in California. In 1962, he graduated from the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Fer deployed to Vietnam in 1966. Soon after arriving, he received a Distinguished Flying Cross piloting through hostile fire. Months later, he earned a Silver Star for leading a flight of two unarmed electronic countermeasures support aircraft and four high cover aircraft into an extremely hazardous area to suppress radar controlled anti-aircraft and surface-to-air missiles in support of strike aircraft. In 1967, North Vietnamese shot down and captured Fer after he ejected out of his plane. For the next six years, North Vietnamese tortured Fer, trying to obtain information, confessions and propaganda materials. North Vietnam released him in 1973.

Later in his career, Fer served as the principal advisor for Prisoner of War and Missing in Action Affairs for the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs. Fer was a Department of Defense representative who contributed significantly to the establishment and implementation of national policy regarding this extremely sensitive matter. His efforts led to significant progress with the Indo-Chinese governments.

During his career, Fer received two Silver Stars, two Defense Superior Service Medals, two Legions of Merit, a Distinguished Flying Cross, three Bronze Star Medals with ♦V♦ devices and a Prisoner of War Medal.

- 3. Tap the plus sign next to Learning & Reference, and then choose Learning Center.
- 4. Go to your app store and download Go.Learn. *Don*�t open it from here.
- Return to your browser. From the same Learning Center page in My Rotary, tap the link to the Learning Center.

Go.Learn works with iOS10 and later as well as Android 6 and later. Note that the app has some limitations, including in some of the interactive learning options. You will need to use a computer to download certificates or view additional resources. Links to the Learning Center may not work on mobile devices. He is survived by his wife, Ina Holland, formerly of Lenoir, now at Abernethy Laurels in Newton; his daughter, Dr. Claire Holland Harraghy and her husband Charles, and his granddaughters Lily and Zoe, of Hickory; his sisters and their husbands and families, Joyce and Curt Pease of St. Augustine, FL and Debbie and Wayne Underwood of Knoxville, TN. He was predeceased by his parents Robert and Edwina Holland of Wyoming, OH and his son, Clay Holland, of Lenoir.

Bob grew up in Wyoming, OH, but came to North Carolina for college at Chapel Hill, where he met his future wife, Ina, and decided to stay in North Carolina after graduating. He started teaching initially, but early in their married life, he found a different direction. He and Ina and went back to the land in northwest Caldwell County, living in a house with no running water, running a farm and working for Blue Ridge Electric. During this time, he built Laurel Cabin, which would become the foundation of his life, and where he would live until 2018.

Bob decided he wanted to live a particular life, and he made it happen, which not many can say. When he met a road block, he found a way around it. When he felt teaching was no longer for him, he found a different job. While living on Bee Mountain, he started an advertising firm, that became the marketing agency Holland and Holland, which he and Ina ran for over 30 years. He believed strongly in giving back to the community, that if you wanted the world to be better, you should work to make it so. While in Lenoir, he joined Rotary and was its

president for a term (introducing the first female member), as well as being on the board of the Caldwell Arts Council, and working with the schools. He tutored children in the local schools throughout his life, and, at the end of his career, went back to teaching before retirement. He also became very involved with Habitat for Humanity, and used his self-taught carpentry skills to build houses for others. He taught himself natural history, became an expert on birds and became a member of Audubon. There was rarely a tree, bird or flower that we would see that he couldnot identify.

He touched many lives, almost always for the better. He encouraged people to be their best, to learn more, to strive for better. He was a champion for equality, and would defend the rights of everyone to live their life equally and with respect. He will be sorely missed, but his life was a celebration of all we could do, so he may go to his rest satisfied that he lived well.

Due to Covid, there will not be a public service or receiving at this time. The family asks that donations be given to Foothills Conservancy (<u>foothillsconservancy.org</u>) and Caldwell County Habitat for Humanity (<u>caldwellhabitat.org</u>).

Robert married Elaine Mary Cerwin from Waukesha, WI in 1956, and they were able to celebrate 64 years of marriage. Robert is survived by his wife, Elaine, brother Alan Richard Cerwin, daughter Debra Cerwin, son, Todd Cerwin (Deanna Cerwin), daughter Janet Johnson (Dwight Johnson), daughter-in-law, Renee Cerwin, grandchildren Joshua Sweeney, Phillip and Taylor Cerwin, Logan, Savannah, and Graham Cerwin, Kaitlin, Jennifer, and Sydney Johnson, and one great grandchild, Ellie Rexrode Johnson-Loomis. He is predeceased by his parents, Anton and Mary Cerwin, and son Eric Cerwin.

Robert and Elaine were married in Milwaukee and moved to Burlington, WI in 1958 to start CerTex Petroleum with Robert s father. He later bought the business to form the Bob Cerwin Company and expanded to include the Firestone Store on Hwy 36, and convenience stores throughout Southern Wisconsin and Northern Illinois.

Robert was very active in the Burlington community and the Plymouth Congregational Church. He joined the Burlington Rotary Club in his late 20s. He served as president of the Burlington Rotary club, District Governor, International Director, and then Vice President of Rotary International. He also held a founding role in initiating and promoting Rotary so global program of eradicating polio worldwide. Devoting countless hours to charity, Robert and Elaine traveled to 54 countries on 6 continents in their service.

He was a highly sought-after international motivational speaker with a unique style of interacting with the audience, relating personal stories, and never giving the same speech twice.

Together, Robert and Elaine formed the non-profit organization, the US chapter of the British charity, Hope and Homes for Children, for orphans of war and disaster in Eastern Europe and Africa.

In his free time, Robert was an avid snowmobiler, held a private pilot license and enjoyed photography.

In 1991, Robert and Elaine moved to North Carolina to be closer to family, having lived abroad from 2011-2015 in Cuenca, Ecuador, and ultimately returning to Shelby, NC.

His children remember him as a loving, kind, engaging, ambitious, fun and devoted Dad.
