Dr. Dan Barnard **High Point Theatre Director**



Dr. Dan Barnard has been Director of High Point Theatre since August. He holds a doctorate in music composi-

tion from the University of Kansas and other music degrees from West Texas State University and Univ of Northern Colorado. Before becoming a venue manager, Dr. Barnard held lecturer and choral conductor positions at Western Nebraska Community College, Penn State University, and Dakota Wesleyan University. He has directed performing arts venues at the University of Texas Brownsville, Broward College in Fort Lauderdale, and Mississippi State University, and he was the first Executive Director for Marty Stuart's Congress of Country Music in Philadelphia Mississippi.

Established in 1975, High Point Theatre is one of the nation's first cooperative ventures between municipal government, private enterprise and the arts.

Over the years, the Theatre has hosted many worldclass artists and performances. Such luminaries as Dolly Parton, Dave Brubeck, Joan Rivers, William Windom, Charles Kuralt and Cloris Leachman have graced the stage. In more recent years, the Theatre has welcomed Boney James, Ricky Skaggs, Kathy Mattea, Barbara Eden, Nneena Freelon and Branford Marsalis just to name a very few. It celebrates its 50th Anniversary in 2025!

A ROTARY STORY YOU HAVE PROBABLY NEVER HEARD



Here is a story about Mrs. Margaret Thatcher and Rotary which you may not know. When Margaret was 12, her older sister Muriel had a letter from her pen friend Edith in Vienna. Edith Muhlbauer was a 17 year old Jewish girl. Be-

cause the Nazis were already rounding up the Jews in Austria, Edith wrote to Muriel to ask if she could raise enough money to help her leave Austria as soon as possible. Muriel enlisted the help of her sister Margaret and together they asked the local Rotary Club for their support. Their father, Alfred Roberts was not only a founder member of the Grantham Club but in the 1930s had been its President. The club readily gave their support and the money was raised quickly. Edith came to England and stayed with the Roberts family in Grantham, at one stage sharing a room with Margaret. Later she stayed with other local Rotarians before being helped on her way to relatives in Brazil.

Among the guests at Mrs. Thatcher's funeral was Betina, Edith's daughter and her husband, who had travelled especially from Sao Paulo, Brazil. In 1995, Prime Minister Thatcher received a Paul Harris Fellowship and at the time, she said, "Its wonderful to know that the Rotary Club in our home town, and my father played their part in defeating the forces of evil, thus enabling a few more souls like Edith to live in freedom."





SO WHAT HAPPENED?

Originally the Point Theatre which opened on April 1, 1915. It was later renamed High Point Theatre and on September 1, 1924 it was renamed American Theatre. The Paramount Theatre was opened on December 25, 1930 by the Publix-Saenger chain with Chester Morris in "The Bat Whispers". The theatre had two balconies and was in an Art Deco style. Later operated by Key Theatres, then by Martin Theatres, who it closed on November 19, 1970 and they opened their Martin Twin Theatres the following day.

The building was owned by the City of High Point. A bond was passed to restore the theatre to live theatre use. About this time, Southern Furniture, who basically occupied the majority of the surrounding block, wanted the theatre property. They wanted it so bad that they promised to build a theatre inside the new exposition building, that was state of art, thereby saving the City of High Point considerable money. The Paramount Theatre was demolished in 1972.

Now you know The Paramount's history. Come this week to discover the High Point Theatre's history or at least the first 50 years of its history. It is alive and going strong!

Don Shaw came forward to recognize Clark Pierce who reached a milestone in his Foundation Giving and was awarded his PH+7 pin. Clark is a Paul Harris Society member.

President Slade then recognized another Pierce, Clark's cousin Mark Pierce who is exiting the Club. He listed many of Mark's accolades, including being a Past President, longtime Spokesman Editor, Club Director, and a perfect attender since 2005. The Club's Board voted to make the extremely active 28 year member an Honorary Member.

Ken Esposito carried a \$ 2,006 pot to the podium along with a dwindling deck of cards. Jeff Benfield's number was drawn, but the Queen escaped unscathed as Jeff uncovered the 3 of Diamonds.

Ken Esposito introduced Asheboro Rotarian Mark Hensley, The District Action Coordinator, .who spoke on District Service. In this new position, begun by 2025-26 D.G. Mark Brandon, Hensley will assist clubs with their Rotary Service.

Hensley reminded us how big Rotary is internationally. With over 45,000 clubs and 1.2 million global Rotarians, Rotary's impact is immense. Yet even with those numbers, the question remains, why would people want to join a civic club? For Rotary, it is about Fellowship, Business Networking, and the number one reason, Service. Still, there remains many people out there who want to give back and don't know how.

The High Point Club, Hemsley admitted, is all about service. He'd done his homework. About Bikes for Kids and Feeding Lisa's Kids. But he still wanted to share more opportunities that exist in our district. The Hurricane Helene storm damage and its lingering impact are part of a marathon effort to help out in the mountains of the state been by District 7690 Rotarians. \$ 230,000 has given financially and beginning in the fall, we will se sending work teams to the impacted areas. Then, there is Pigstock, the fundraiser for girls in Vietnam. It is in




