
September 27, 2019 Speaker - Dr. Shelton Earp

Our speaker for today was Dr. Shelton (Shelley) Earp, Distinguished Professor and Lineberger Professor of Cancer Research, and the Director of the Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center at the UNC School of Medicine. In his role as Director he oversees the basic, translational, clinical, and population science research at the Cancer Center. His laboratory studies signal transduction in normal and neoplastic cells to determine new therapeutic options in a range of cancer including breast, lung, pancreatic, and prostate cancer as well as leukemias and melanoma. He has conducted groundbreaking research into oncogenes (genes that in under certain conditions can transform cells into cancer cells). He has published over 190 articles in peer-reviewed journals and has been continuously funded by the National Institutes of Health for over forty years. Beyond his work at UNC and Lineberger, he sits on the boards of ten university cancer centers.

Dr. Earp presented a lightning-round discussion of the advances in cancer research at UNC Lineberger, summarizing work at the social, epidemiologic, basic science, and clinical levels that is revolutionizing the treatment of cancer. Lineberger has grown from its origins in 1990 from about a dozen clinicians and researchers to 450 members throughout the university. While its position within a top university medical school and top university ensure an emphasis on high-quality, groundbreaking research, he noted that the bedrock of the Cancer Center ♦s work is good clinical care and service to patients. The Cancer Center has earned an exceptional NCI (National Cancer Institute) score, recognizing Lineberger as a national leader in cancer care and research. The North Carolina Cancer Hospital, which is the flagship site for UNC cancer care and the home of the Lineberger Cancer Center, opened ten years ago. In the first year they saw 2500 patients, and they are now seeing 7500 new patients annually, which reflects not only growth in population and in the number of new cancer cases but also in the numbers of patients who are undergoing screening and detection of cancers.

Our next Speaker ♦ Justice Paul Martin Newby



Justice Paul Martin Newby is the Senior Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, having first been elected in 2004. Justice Newby is an Adjunct Professor at Campbell University School of Law, where he teaches courses on state constitutional law and appellate practice. He is also the co-author of *The North Carolina State Constitution with History and Commentary* (2d ed. 2013) with Professor John V. Orth of the University of North Carolina School of Law. The North Carolina Bar Association honored Justice Newby in 2011 with its Citizen Lawyer Award, and in 2012 he received its John McNeill Smith, Jr. Award, recognizing his work in the area of constitutional rights and responsibilities. In recognition of his professional service, Justice Newby received the James Iredell Award and an Honorary Doctor of Laws from Southern Wesleyan University.

Born in Asheboro, North Carolina on May 5, 1955, he was raised in Jamestown. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Public Policy Studies (magna cum laude) from Duke University and a Juris Doctor from the University of North Carolina School of Law. He began his law practice in Asheville with Van Winkle, Buck, Wall, Starnes, and Davis, P.A. and later served as Vice President and General

Counsel of Cannon Mills Realty and Development Corporation in Kannapolis. In 1985, Justice Newby was appointed as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Eastern District of North Carolina in Raleigh where he served for over nineteen years. He played an integral role in conducting the undercover sting operation which recovered North Carolina's original copy of the Bill of Rights, stolen during the Civil War.

Justice Newby has been married to Macon Tucker Newby since 1983, and they have four children. He and his wife attend Christ Baptist Church in Raleigh where he is an Elder and Sunday School teacher.
