March 26, 2021 Speaker - Ricky Moore

Ricky Moore was introduced by DG Martin who had recently interviewed him on the release of his new cookbook. Ricky was born and raised near New Bern. After a 7-yr stint cooking for the Army he decided to make cooking his career and graduated from the CIA in Hyde Park, NY.

Ricky explained that he loved the kitchen and he had two grandmothers who developed his palate. His family gathered a lot; they had chickens and fresh vegetables from the garden and of course, fished and crabbed. He stressed that military cooking was not the gruel we might imagine but that cooks did their best to make it the best part of the day for the servicemen. At the CIA he learned the how and why of success in the kitchen. He was

able to cook in some great high end restaurants in DC, NYC, San Francisco, Paris, Singapore and Germany. In many, he worked without pay as a ◊stagier◊ to learn from the best. When he returned to NC, his goal was not ◊high end◊ but rather food with mass appeal. He opened his first business on Mangum St at the entrance to downtown Durham; the ◊Salt Box◊ was inspired by the small stalls in the open air markets of Singapore that served fabulous food without fuss. He likes to cook the more unusual fish caught in season off our coast: Sheepshead, Butterfish, Mullet and Spot. He encourages customers to give the ◊Try Me◊ menu a chance. He wants to educate his consumers. He added a food truck and offered catering. He then bought the former ◊Shrimp Boat◊, the original 1969 building of the chain, shaped like a fish house.

Ricky was terrified when the pandemic came but he kept his core team together and pivoted to ◊to go◊ meals. He was able to work out a cooperative arrangement with Steve, a fisherman, who would bring the raw product to the Farmer◊s Market and Ricky would be cooking the fish in a big cauldron nearby and this way, they both made sales at the market. He even made prepared meals that were distributed to the school children during this pandemic. He believes the local neighborhood sustained his business through the pandemic.

During the Q&A Bill asked him how on earth to make Mullet taste good. Ricky said that for oily ◊fishy◊ fish, the best thing is to smoke them. For young people considering being a chef, he advises that it requires stamina. There are many different environments and ways of being a chef.

Anne grew up on a farm in Nebraska before attending Dartmouth College. She pursued her love of science and education, which led to a formative five years as a middle school science teacher. After earning a Doctor of Education degree in Education Policy at Harvard, Anne worked as a consultant for Harvard's Data Wise project where she helped schools around the country implement data-based improvement practices. From there, Anne became Chief Program Officer at Project Lead The Way, a national nonprofit and leading provider of STEM curriculum. She helped expand access to hands-on STEM curriculum and professional development to over 8,000 schools across the US. Now, Anne co-leads District C, a Triangle based nonprofit that is preparing the next generation of diverse talent for modern work.
