



# Sponsorships, tickets on sale for 2023 fundraiser, 'Leaders in Service' named

Ticket sales have begun for the May 4 "Leaders in Service" award banquet, and our solicitation team is still pursing sponsorships for the event.

The 2023 honorees were chosen in mid-February. Each will be recognized for leading their organization in harmony with Rotary's "Service above Self" motto and the Four-Way Test.

Honored will be **Capt. Terry Bragg** in the public-sector category, **Dr. Thomas Dalton** in the non-profit sector, and **Amy Wright** in the private sector. Bragg is director of the Battleship North Carolina; Dalton heads the Eden Village housing project for the homeless; and Wright founded Bitty & Beau's, a chain of coffee shops that employ people with



disabilities.

Sponsorships range from the \$10,000 "platinum" level to \$1,000 "friends of Rotary" recognitions. Rotarians who are not sponsors are encouraged to attend the banquet as well; individual tickets are \$150 each.

The sponsorships and ticket sales are the chief source of funds for club projects in the 2023-24 Rotary year. We are aiming for gross revenues of \$85,000, and hoping for a "stretch" goal of \$100,000. Subtracting expenses of roughly \$17,000, mostly for the banquet and publicity, last year's first-ever Leaders in Service awards netted more than \$61,600 for our club's non-profit foundation. We hope this year's net proceeds will be closer to \$70,000, but so far we are about \$14,000 short of our goal.

The reception, dinner, and award ceremony will be at UNC-Wilmington's Burney Center.

## Region's Rotarians join to pre-fabricate walls for Habitat

The walls have all been framed for the Wilmington-area Rotary Habitat for Humanity House, which will go up in the new Legacy Landing subdivision later this spring.

The first build day for this project, which this club and half a dozen others are sponsoring, was Jan. 28 in Habitat's warehouse. Volunteers, including the buyer who will make this house her family's home, pounded nails to assemble pre-fab wall sections. Those will be trucked to the site, erected, and nailed into place during the next build day, yet to be scheduled.

The project is still several thousand dollars shy of the \$60,000 budget the Rotary coalition has committed to. Much of the house's additional cost will come from a mortgage that Habitat provides to the home buyer.

### An overdue dues crackdown

The club's Board of Directors has issued an ultimum about members whose dues are badly in arrears. As President Dale Smith announced Feb. 21, all members more than 90 days behind on dues payments will get certified letters asking for full payment within 15 days. Anyone who doesn't comply within that time will be expelled from the club.

As of Feb. 21, 26 members had unpaid balances more than 90 days old. Dale noted that the club is obliged to pay district and international dues for all members, whether they have paid up or not.

"This is obviously not fair," Dale said, "and therefore a violation of the four-way test."

## **Rotarians welcome Ukrainian refugees**

Two Ukrainian mothers who fled the war with their children have settled in Wilmington and are seeking work, with help from area Rotarians.

Area Governor Dan Parks of Wilmington East Rotary Club is leading that effort, seeking \$25,000 to help them become contributing members of the community. In addition to money, needs include permanent housing, transportation and childcare support. The families are temporarily living in a pool house in a Rotarian's back yard.

The children are in school and the mothers are studying English. The fathers remain in Ukraine, which is not allowing men of military age to leave the country.

The initial relocation process for the first two families included plane fares totalling around \$4,000, plus \$12,000 to support them for the first three months.
