We celebrate this month by highlighting RYLA, Interact, Rotaract, the Boys & Girls Homes of NC, and our Youth Exchange program. We are fortunate to have so many dedicated district leaders and Rotarians who give so freely of their time and expertise to help young people across our district gain new experiences, make new connections and witness the power of Rotary.

This past January, approximately 80 junior high school students from across our district attended RYLA at the Trinity Center in Pine Knoll Shores. District RYLA Chair Phil Panzarella as well as several other Rotarians and guest speakers led an impactful and life-changing program. Students met new friends, learned about themselves and each other, and gained valuable leadership skills. The Cultural Walk remains a powerful part of the weekend experience.

Interact is growing in our district with five new clubs chartering this year, including East Carteret, GLOW Academy, White Oak, Thomas Academy and, very soon, Topsail High School. We welcome the Rotaract Club of UNCW, which was chartered in April as the newest members of our Rotary family. The Boys and Girls Homes of North Carolina is dedicated to providing a comprehensive array of residential and community-based services to meet the needs of vulnerable children by addressing their physical, emotional, social, educational and spiritual development. District Co-Chairs Vince Juric and Joe Coffey are available to share the latest news and needs of this amazing organization.

This Rotary year our district was fortunate to have a high school student approach the Rotary Club of Fayetteville regarding a youth exchange opportunity. Nolan Krieg spent the academic year in Germany with his host family and returns in June. As part of the exchange program, our district welcomed Leora Desgranges from Limon, France in August. At this time we also would like to thank Past District Governor Lee Dixon for his service as our COL representative for the term 2020-23. PDG Lee participated in two Council on Resolutions and one Council on Legislation on behalf of our district and provided Rotarians with the COL reports.

The Council on Legislation (COL) is the governing body of Rotary International. Representatives from every district meet once every 3 years in Chicago to consider and vote on proposed legislation that would change Rotary's governing documents (Constitution of RI, RI Bylaws, and/or Standard Rotary Club Constitution.)

The Council on Resolutions meets online every year and considers resolutions that are outside the purview of the constitutional documents. If passed, these resolutions then go to the RI Board for consideration. RI must receive proposed resolutions from the clubs and district, including an endorsement by the District Governor, by June 30th prior to the Council of Resolutions. Please remember resolutions should not be local specific, but affect issues related to the global Rotary network.

sponsoring Rotary, a school administrator or faculty member, or a community volunteer serving as an adult contact to the Interact club. Although more than one person may serve in this role for your Interact club, Rotary International requires only one individual to be reported per Rotary each year (1 July – 30 June).

Even if your Interact clubs are "inactive" due to Covid or other reasons, consider keeping the charter active by reporting an advisor.

How can we be inclusive as a Rotary Club?

HOW CAN WE BE INCLUSIVE AS A ROTARY CLUB?

Excerpt from an article by Dale Roberts, District Governor, District 5020

One of the hot-button topics in society in general and Rotary clubs, in particular, is the concept of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). Rotary International has adopted DEI as a core value.

The only problem is that almost everyone has a different idea of what DEI means.

Rotary is a membership organization. We depend on having members to achieve our service goals. We depend on having members to fund our projects and the Rotary Foundation. We depend on members to make other members feel welcome and accepted.

Former members have been polled to discover the reasons that they leave Rotary. Once you discard those who leave because of external factors (relocation, health, family matters) the two most common factors are "unmet expectations" and "club culture". In other words, they did not feel included, either in the work of the club or in the social aspects of the club.

Rotary is a non-political, non-religious organization, but individual Rotarians are often both. In many clubs, you will find that equally dedicated and effective Rotarians have completely contrary political views, or they are devout followers of different faiths. The joy of Rotary is that those members can work closely to achieve the same Rotary goals, they can share the joy of Rotary fellowship and they can even be good friends. They do not have to change their views or beliefs.

To quote Dr. Martin Luther King, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness." Rotary does not become younger by getting rid of old Rotarians. It gets younger by making Rotary more accessible and relevant to younger persons. Rotary does not become more diverse, by any measure, by making Rotarians more uncomfortable. It becomes more diverse by giving the opportunity to membership to a wider group- and being warm, welcoming, accommodating and enjoyable to be around.

Inclusivity is our superpower. Let's use it for the betterment of the world.

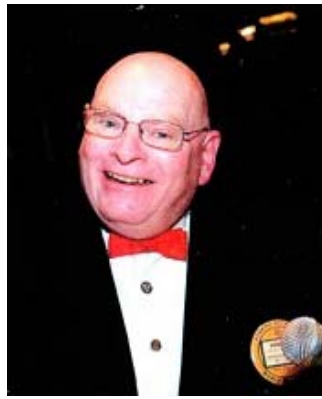

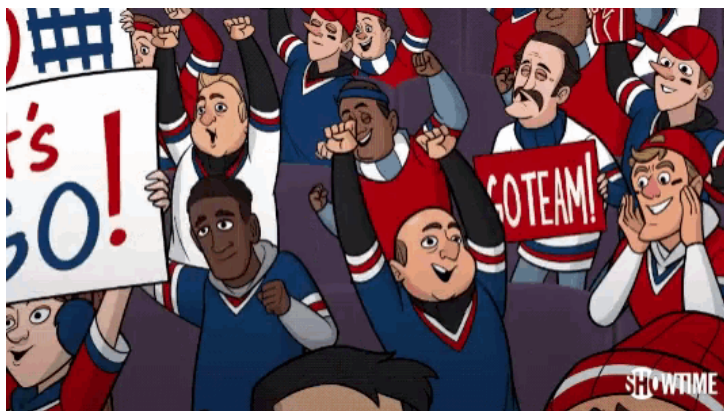
