From there, Bahamian clubs will begin their own projects as they distribute these items to schools, homeless shelters, domestic violence centers, and underprivileged neighborhoods. Can for Nominations - Nominate Four Outstanding Club Leader to Serve as District Governor

Nominate Your Outstanding Club Leader to Serve as District Governor FY 2028-29 (Application Deadline 10/31/24)

Your Rotary district invites nominations of outstanding club leaders to serve as District Governor for the year 2028-29. This is an incredible honor for the individual as well as your club. The District Governor serves as your official representative to Rotary International and is one of only 529 district governors world-wide!

District Governors are selected as the District Governor Nominee Designate (DGND) three years before their term.

Applicants for the position must fulfill certain requirements, including:

- 1. having previously served as President of a Rotary club, and
- 2. being a member of Rotary for at least seven years by the time they become District Governor on July 1, 2028.

Membership attrition is inevitable. The District recently had a Membership Seminar where we mourned the death of the Rotary Club of Attritionville. Your Club is probably going to lose members this year. Your President has probably set a membership goal for the year. This isn't the number of new members to be added to your Club. It is a net membership goal. It's where your Club wants to be AFTER attrition. Let's say your Club has averaged losing 3 members each year over the past 3 years. It is amazing how steady attrition is. Chances are you are going to lose about 3 members this year. If your Club plans to increase its size by 5 this year, then your Club will have to add 8 new members to overcome attrition.

Now is the time to start adding new members. It is SO much easier to spread this effort out over the entire year, rather than engaging in a crash effort next May and June.
