Youth Services (Interact, Rotaract, RYLA, Rotary Youth Exchange)

INTERACT - is a service club for young people ages 12-18 who are passionate about making a difference while learning about the world and themselves. And having fun! Your Interact club will be expected to organize at least two projects every year: one that helps your school or community and one that promotes international understanding.

ROTARACT - Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18 and older to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service. In communities worldwide, Rotary and Rotaract members work side by side to take action through service. From big cities to rural villages, Rotaract is changing communities like yours. Rotaract members decide how to organize and run their clubs, manage their own funds, and plan and carry out activities and service projects. Rotary club sponsors offer guidance and support and work with your club as partners in service.

RYLA - Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive leadership experience organized by Rotary and Rotaract clubs, districts, and multidistricts where youth develop skills as a leader while having fun and making connections. Our District provides this opportunity to rising high school juniors and seniors.

RYE - Rotary Youth Exchange students learn a new language, discover another culture, and truly become global citizens. Exchanges for students ages 15-19 are sponsored by Rotary clubs in more than 100 countries.

Duck Races Around the World

World record rubber duck washes ashore 18 years later: â€[~]We got a bit excitedâ€[™]

A rubber

duck that escaped a failed world record attempt nearly 18 years ago in Ireland has been found by a Scottish teen more than 400 miles away.

They quacked the case of The Missing Toy Duck.

<u>A rubber duck</u> that escaped a failed world record attempt nearly 18 years ago in Ireland has been found by a Scottish teen more than 400 miles away, <u>SWNS reports</u>.

150,000 yellow rubber ducks were launched into the River Liffey in Dublin as part of the charity World Duck Race Ireland in June 2006. After being released from Millennium Bridge, the ducks were supposed to travel 1 kilometer down the river and pass under five bridges.

Despite organizer Children's Lifeline Challenge's attempts to collect them all, several broke free into the sea. Now, one has been found 423 miles away on the island of Stronsay in the Orkney archipelago in Scotland.

a∈cerne spring uses have been really right recently, and my son was warking the dogs along the shore,â∈ Marion explained. â∈œHe was finding some bits and pieces and then he said, â∈ Thereâ∈™s a rubber duck.'â€

She said Filip put it in his pocket and placed it by the sink at home.

"I had a look at it and saw writing on it,†Marion continued. "That's when I saw it said, â€~World Record Duck Race, Ireland 2006,' and so we got a bit excited and started Googling it.â€

Each duck in the race was sponsored, with the first duck to pass under five bridges being declared the winner $\hat{a} \in "$ the winning sponsor was awarded a trip to the US.

Other ducks from the race have been found in <u>Morecambe, England</u>, and the <u>Isle of Wight</u> in the English Channel $\hat{a} \in "$ with one even being spotted in Sweden.

Marion compared her sonâ€[™]s find to a message in a bottle.

"You always wonder what the story is and where it's come from, so it's really special to be able to learn about its journey,†Marion enthused. "It was so long ago as well â€″ 18 years ago, and the writing is still intact on it, and it even has a number on it.â€

As her discovery circulated on social media, users began wondering about the future of the duck.

Marion says thereâ€[™]s no chance that sheâ€[™]s tossing it.

 $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{C}I$ was reading some of the comments on Instagram, and some people were concerned about the plastic on the sea, $\hat{a}\in$ she noted.

<u>An estimated 11 million metric tons of plastic</u> enter the ocean each year, injuring and killing fish, birds, and other marine life that ingest it or get entangled in it.

"Somebody had said it was a shame that this little duck had bobbed all the way from Ireland just to go in the bin â€″ but he's definitely not going in the bin,†Marion added. "I don't think we'l keep him in the bath, but we're definitely going to keep it on the shelflâ€
